Designing

- Design appealing products for a particular user based on simple design criteria.
- Generate initial ideas and design criteria through investigating a variety of fruit and vegetables.
- Communicate these ideas through talk and drawings.

<u>Making</u>

- Use simple utensils and equipment to e.g. peel, cut, slice, squeeze, grate and chop safely.
- Select from a range of fruit and vegetables according to their characteristics e.g. colour, texture and taste to create a chosen product.

Evaluating

- Taste and evaluate a range of fruit and vegetables to determine the intended user's preferences.
- Evaluate ideas and finished products against design criteria, including intended user and purpose.

Technical knowledge and understanding

- Understand where a range of fruit and vegetables come from e.g. farmed or grown at home.
- Understand and use basic principles of a healthy and varied diet to prepare dishes, including how fruit and vegetables are part of The Eatwell Plate.
- Know and use technical and sensory vocabulary relevant to the project.

- Understand the benefits of physical exercise, time outdoors, community participation, voluntary and service-based activity on mental wellbeing and happiness.
- Know the characteristics and mental and physical benefits of an active lifestyle.
- Know what constitutes a healthy diet (including understanding calories and other nutritional content).
- Know about dental health and the benefits of good oral hygiene and dental flossing, including regular check-ups at the dentist.
- Know the benefits of rationing time spent online, the risks of excessive time spent on electronic devices and the impact of positive and negative content online on their own and others' mental and physical wellbeing.
- Know where and how to report concerns and get support with issues online.
- Learn about how the internet and digital devices can be used safely to find things out and to communicate with others.
- Learn about the role of the internet in everyday life.





	 Learn that not all information seen online is true. Know about safe and unsafe exposure to the sun, and how to reduce the risk of sun damage, including skin cancer. Know simple self-care techniques, including the importance of rest, time spent with friends and family and the benefits of hobbies and interests. Be able to recognise early signs of physical illness, such as weight loss, or unexplained changes to the body. Money Matters - Children will: Learn what money is; forms that money comes in; that money comes from different sources. Learn what money needs to be looked after; different ways of doing this. Learn that people make different choices about how to save and spend money. Learn that jobs help people to earn money to pay for things. Learn that everyone has different strengths. Earn about different jobs that people they know or people who work in the community do. Learn about some of the strengths and interests someone might need to do different jobs.
